

RESEARCH COLLABORATION

RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS

A research collaboration between the Department of Human Geography at Uppsala University and the College of Education at the University of Otago continues after Dr. Micheline van Riemsdijk's recent research stay in Dunedin. An article investigating refugee integration policy and practice in Sweden and New Zealand has been produced together with Vivienne Anderson, Dean of the College of Education, and Anna Burgin, PhD student in Peace and Conflict Studies.



The Landscapes of Complex Societies
Research and Impact Group is a
collaboration between Durham
University, the Institute of Archaeological
Science at Eberhard Karls Universitaet
Tübingen and the Institute for Climate and
Atmospheric Sciences at the University of
Leeds. Within the group, the CLaSS project
(led by Dr. Dan Lawrence, Durham
University), investigates the relationship
between climate fluctuations and the
emergence of complex social and political
formations over the last 8000 years.

RESEARCH SEED FUND

To further promote research collaboration within the Matariki Network, September 2023 will see the launch of the Matariki Network Research Seed Fund. Through a competitive process, we will jointly advertise, select and fund a number of collaborative bi-, tri and multilateral research projects between MNU institutions. Researchers can apply for a maximum grant of £25,000 for a project duration of 12-24 months, beginning in the first part of 2024. Successful research projects are expected to ultimately result in outcomes such as third-party funding applications, larger-scale collaborations and significant joint publications.





NEW GUIDING PRINCIPLES

During the September 2022 Executive Board meeting, the Matariki Network defined five new Guiding Principles/Core Values as follows:

- 1. **Commitment to Transnational Dialogue:** Intentionally creating opportunities to discuss similar issues from different perspectives; structured and resourced appropriately;
- 2. Academic Freedom and Autonomy, Freedom of Expression: Courage to have, respect and protect difficult conversations among all constituents, (students, faculty and professional staff);
- 3. **Respect for Diversity:** We enable, encourage and promote diversity in all that we do, and we commit to Indigenisation;
- 4. **Critical Friendship:** We offer a safe space that respects the truths of all perspectives and are a trusted, close-knit network of friends;
- 5. Purposeful Collaboration for Improving Lives: We always remain grounded in why we exist; to have positive impact, social purpose, and to make a difference in our communities.

PRIORITY ACTIVITES


- 1. **Develop** new (and refine current) curricular and co-curricular collaborative activities for students;
- 2. **Foster** research collaborations Create thematic opportunities, sabbatical support, funding support and infrastructure;
- 3. *Collective advocacy and action* on big issues: More strategic connection on research Grand Challenges;
- 4. *Intensify engagement*: Building trust and ties, getting to know each other better;
- 5. *Civic engagement* Learn from each other on how we engage with our local- and regional communities;
- 6. Raise MNU's profile and global reach.

STUDENT MOBILITY









Global Citizenship

The Common Purpose Global Citizenship Programme started as a response to COVID-19 travel restrictions but has since turned into a longer-term activity for students across the Matariki Network.

Over the course of three weeks, Matariki Network students engage with one another online while taking part in asynchronous online learning focusing on the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.

At the end of the course, students who have successfully completed the associated assignments are eligible to receive a Common Purpose microcredential.



Matariki Leadership Initiative

Over the course of April and May 2023, the Matariki Network of Universities hosted the second Leadership Initiative programme (launched in late 2021). Designed to connect professional colleagues from across the Network, the 2023 Leadership Initiative welcomed 44 participants from Durham University, University of Otago, Queen's University, and Uppsala University. The 2023 cohort attended a combination of synchronous, asynchronous, online and institutional-in-person events targeted to promote discussion and learning around the successes and challenges faced by today's leaders in a post-pandemic world. Presenters throughout the programme included: Tina Dacin from Queen's University, Jane Davis from the Flourishing Institute, and Paul Gentle from Invisible Grail, as well as a panel discussion featuring leaders from among our institutions, Joanne Race from Durham University, David Thomson from University of Otago, and Sultan Almajil from Queen's University.

The next Matariki Leadership Initiative is planned for 2025, while 2024 will see the start of a new online alumni programme for our 2021 and 2023 cohorts.

LOOKING FORWARD

After a period of great global challenge since our last official report was published in 2020, I am delighted to see that collaborative activities are beginning to flourish once more and that exciting new opportunities are on the horizon for our members.

As the world we live in becomes ever more complex and dynamic, networks such as Matariki become increasingly vital in promoting collaboration and active dialogue. There are several exciting new initiatives currently under development, which I am sure will help to improve outcomes and increase benefits for our partner institutions. The Research Seed Fund in particular will be a valuable mechanism for researchers across the Network to connect and further their research into important areas of both Sciences and Arts & Humanities.

This support has been critical in ensuring that Matariki continues to provide real value for its members. I look forward with optimism to what the next few years will bring for our Network and members, as we continue to advance Matariki's mission of "partnering for a better world"
